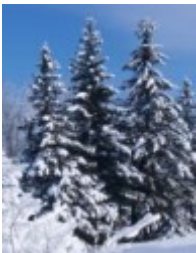

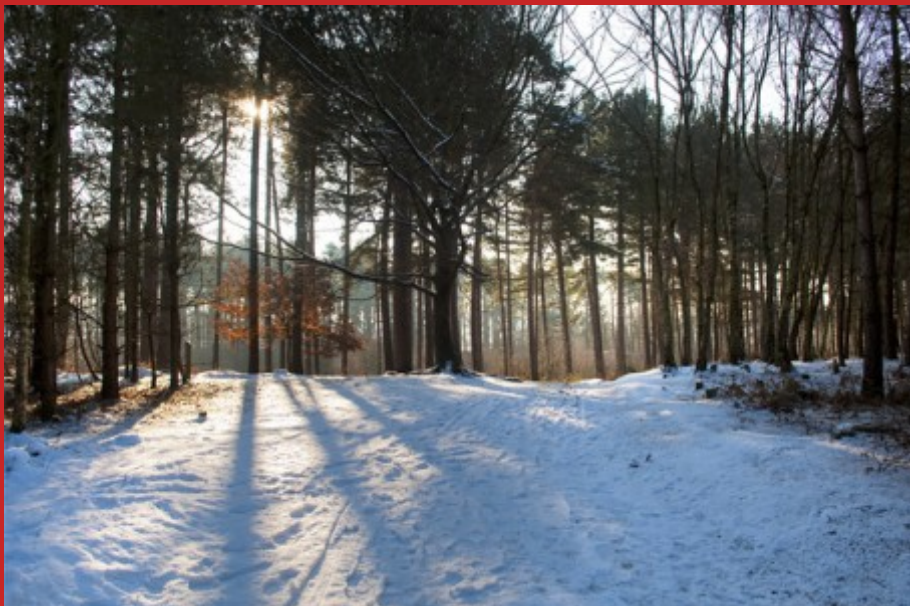
Season's greetings one and all

Our top five festive woodland walks

1. Ainsdale woodland path

Ainsdale National Nature Reserve is a must for lovers of wildlife. This easy walk takes you to the heart of its woodlands.

2. Carey Park and Witton Mill

Explore Northwich Woodlands from the town centre. A circular walk encompassing a variety of different wildlife habitats.

Tree O'Clock world record attempt

Volunteers and community groups from across The Mersey Forest teamed up this month for a Guinness World Record attempt to plant as many trees as possible in one hour across multiple locations.

The BBC Breathing Places event saw The Friends of Griffin Wood (check out their new [blog](#)) team up with St.Helens' Ramblers to plant over 100 trees at Griffin Wood, the Friends of Anderton and Marbury plant 80 trees (report [here](#)), and Speke's Friends of Mill Wood and Alder Wood collaborating with Lancashire Wildlife Trust to plant 400 trees.

With further tree planting happening at Church Wood in Whitegate, Cheshire, and at Kentmere Avenue allotments, St.Helens, all involved are waiting with baited breath to see if the current record of 653,000 trees nationwide has been broken.

Research shows £2m per year impact of European funding for woodlands

Communities in the Northwest are £2m per year better off thanks to new woodlands created by just one of The Mersey Forest's funding streams.

Research was carried out by Regeneris Consulting into the economic impact of Mersey Forest projects funded by the European Union's Merseyside Objective One programme.

The study looked at a range of benefits that result from the new green spaces (like fresh air and exercise) and then developed a

model that put a monetary value on each one.

Top of the list, with a value of more than £900,000 a year across the region, is the benefit of having a woodland view, either from home or on a regular journey, such as the daily commute to work.

The Forest also brings great advantages in terms of health and wellbeing. Tree planting reduces air pollution - which can contribute to asthma and strokes, for example - and this

was calculated to bring benefits worth over £100,000 a year.

In total over the next 50 years, the £7m Objective One funding (which has now ended) will generate an extra £70m of benefits.

Award for "real difference made" by Forests' green infrastructure role

The impact of a green infrastructure prospectus commissioned by Community Forests North West (the charity supporting The Mersey Forest, Red Rose Forest and Pennine Edge Forest) and Natural England, has been recognised at the [Landscape Institute Awards 2009](#).

Awarding the Landscape Policy prize to the [Liverpool and Manchester City Region Green Infrastructure Prospectus](#), judges said that since its launch in 2005 the document "has had a major effect on national and regional policy and advocacy and has made a real difference."

The prospectus by consultants [TEP](#) set the context and identified

the priorities for improving the planning and delivery of green infrastructure in the Liverpool and Manchester City Regions. At a time when green infrastructure was a less-familiar concept than it is now, the project presented a vision for the city regions that placed environmental improvements alongside built development: at the core of delivering sustainable communities and quality of life.

A long way in four years
Four years on, green infrastructure is now embedded in the Regional Spatial Strategy, we have a North West Green Infrastructure [guide](#) and [website](#), both Greater Manchester and Liverpool City Region are now developing green infrastructure

frameworks, and the green infrastructure approach is informing regeneration initiatives across the region.

As a result the prospectus's key [commitments and recommendations](#) to combat shortfalls in policy and action have now all either been achieved or are underway - with a new set of priorities now emerging for the decade to come.

How to recycle your real Christmas tree in each local authority within The Mersey Forest

CHESHIRE WEST AND CHESTER

Christmas trees can be recycled at a range of locations across Cheshire West and Chester. To find out how to recycle your tree in your area, call Cheshire West and Chester Council on 0300 123 8 123 and select option 6.

HALTON

Real Christmas trees in Halton can be recycled at:

The Christmas trees can be recycled in the Green Waste skips which are then sent for recycling into compost. The sites are open every day except Christmas Day from 8am to 6pm.

KNOWSLEY

Christmas trees can be recycled from Saturday 2 January to Sunday 10 January between 10am and 4pm at the following community recycling points:

Halewood Park, Okell Drive, Halewood
Millbrook Park Millennium Green, Old Hall Lane, Kirkby
Court Hey Park, Roby Road, Huyton
Holy Family Social Club

Don't forget to use your grey recycling bin and community recycling points to recycle glass, cans, paper, plastic and cardboard.

LIVERPOOL

In Liverpool, you can drop off your real Christmas tree for recycling at the following locations:

Croxteth Park - Oak Lane car park

Everton Park - Viewing Platform, Netherfield Road North

Long Lane Recreation Ground - Garston

Newsham Park - Gardeners Drive (Sheil Road end)

Otterspool Promenade - First car park

Sefton Park - Lark Lane entrance

Stanley Park - car park

Wavertree Park - tennis centre car park

Woolton Road - boys club car park

All the drop off locations have 24-hour access except for Croxteth Park which is open 7am to 7pm.

SEFTON

After Christmas, Sefton Council's Cleansing Services will run a doorstep collection of Christmas trees for composting for residents in the borough. To arrange a Saturday collection, please call Sefton Plus on 0845-140 0845. The service is limited and will be operated on a first come, first served basis.

Christmas trees can also be left at drop off points at Lifeboat Road in Formby, Crosby Marina as well as the WRS Composting site, located at New Causeway just off the Formby Bypass, during opening hours. Trees are to be left throughout January 2009.

Similarly all the Household Waste Recycling Centres in Sefton will also accept Christmas trees for composting and offer other recycling services as well.

These are open from 8am to 5pm and are located at Foul Lane, Southport, Altcar Road, Formby, Sefton Lane, Maghull and Irlam Road, Bootle. The sites will be closed on Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day.

Residents are reminded to remove all decorations and any metal base brackets before recycling their tree.

ST.HELENS

Real Christmas trees can be recycled at the following locations and times:

Naylor Wood car park, from 1030am to 3.30pm, Sunday 10th January

Sherdley Park at 10am, Sunday 10th January

Taylor Park at 10am, Sunday 10th January

Rectory Nursery from 11am to 3pm, Saturday 9th January

In Warrington you can recycle your real Christmas tree in the garden waste containers located at:

The community recycling centres are open every day except Christmas Day, Boxing Day and New Year's Day. Opening times are 8am to 4pm.
